Infection Control ... SHSM Supporting Student Learning on an Important Topic

In Fall 2019, the Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) Regional Team, through the planning and leader-ship of Casey Daleman (Curriculum Consultant of Science K-12), offered an Infectious Disease Workshop for secondary science teachers as a teacher training session for the SHSM Health and Wellness sector compulsory certification of Infection Control. The purpose of the training session, held at Huron Heights Secondary School and presented by Boreal Science, was to be able to have the trained teachers offer this certification in their schools to SHSM Health and Wellness students. The teachers were given digital resources and a kit of personal protective equipment (PPE) materials made available from Boreal Science to assist them in this delivery.

Adriana Dipietro along with Karen Almeida, both science teachers at Dr. G. W. Williams Secondary School, have been able to provide this training to their SHSM Health and Wellness students through their HOSA Canada club (Health Occupations Students of America). The club hosted two lunchtime sessions in the month of February, where Dipietro combined ideas from the online modules (previously used by students) and the presentation from the training session, along with the supplies to deliver the certification. She said, "The PPE came in handy for demonstrations". There are other teachers in schools around the region transferring their knowledge of Infection Control to SHSM students through their classrooms or in after-school learning sessions including Unionville H.S., Stouffville D.S.S., Pierre Elliott Trudeau H.S., Mulock S.S. and others.

This particular teacher training was a new venture for YRDSB SHSM programming and the Regional Team looks forward to providing more opportunities for this type of learning in the future.

Dual Credits in YRDSB!

Use Credits are a great way to explore college opportunities and earn high school credits at the same time! Eligible Grade 11 and 12 students can take a variety of college credit courses that count towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma at no cost. In YRDSB, there are over 70 different course options offered through our college partners including: Centennial, Fleming, Georgian, George Brown, Humber and Seneca. Most of the Dual Credit courses take place once a week for fourteen weeks in a semester. There are some spring courses offered through April-June in a condensed format for seven weeks. Dual Credits are funded through the School College Work Initiative (SCWI) to assist students in completing their OSSD requirements, and make a successful transition to college and/or apprenticeship programs.



Farm to Fork - Food Choices, Sustainability and Improved Well-being

I was involved in the Farm to Fork - Food Choices, Sustainability and Improved Well-being project coordinated by Sutton District High School. The process we undertook to develop the project allowed for input from teachers, community partners and students. I think having the various perspectives from different partners allowed for students to participate in an innovative community-connected experiential learning experience. We were able to share the program planning process that public health nutrition goes through when planning a program for a target population. This takes into consideration not only the target group's level of food literacy but also the social determinants of health. By providing a real life practical example to students, it gave them a new found knowledge of the considerations that need to be taken into account when working with diverse population groups.

Students researched different nutritional needs of various populations of interest and applied their knowledge by preparing a recipe that would not only meet their target group's nutritional needs but was delicious as well. This learning was enhanced by having the students showcase their tasty creations during a lunch health fair, where younger students could learn from the older students about the nutritional needs of various population groups in our community.

I thoroughly enjoyed participating in this project. Not only did I find the process to be beneficial for the students, but working directly with the high school students and their teachers gave me a better understanding and insight into the needs of school staff and students. This will allow me to take what I have learned and enhance our public health programming for this target group.

Diagnosing my Career Options ... through Co-op and SHSM

When I signed up for Co-op, I knew that I wanted a career related to the medical field, but I was not sure which one to pursue as there are many options. For my Co-op, I decided on the diagnostic field and secured a placement at the **Oak Ridges Medical Diagnostic Imaging Centre (ORMDI)**. My Co-op teacher informed me that I had to work extra hard as an ambassador of Co-op to overcome the "less than ideal" reputation left at that placement by previous Co-op students, but I was up for the challenge. At ORMDI, I was fortunate to rotate every two weeks through different departments of Mammography, Nuclear Medicine, Reception, Ultrasound and X-Ray. In each department, I learned about the procedures and tasks that each technician had to fulfill. Through this exposure, I was able to ask questions directly of staff and understand the different career pathways involved.

As a result of my department rotations, I found out that I liked the X-Ray department best. In X-Ray, every day and every patient is different, so not knowing what to expect keeps the job interesting. One surprising case that I witnessed was of a patient sent with a requisition indicating that the patient had "swallowed a foreign body". When we took the X-Ray, we found out that the patient had a CO₂ canister embedded in the stomach. I was shocked because this is something that I would not have expected to see, but I remained professional and my supervisor and I successfully completed the diagnostic X-Ray.

If you are planning to take Co-op, then you really must consider signing up for a Specialist High School Major (SHSM) program. My participation in the **SHSM - Health and Wellness** sector program provided me with essential training and experiences that I can use for my career aspirations and in my life in general. Through SHSM, I went on a one-day field trip to McMaster University where I toured the university, participated in the electrophoresis activity and listened to a professor making connections from SHSM to post-secondary opportunities. During another excursion, I was trained in "Stop the Bleed" at Sunnybrook Hospital, an advanced first aid certification, and also enjoyed a tour and discussion with an emergency room doctor. On another field trip at Southlake Hospital, with the Preventing Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (PARTY) tour, we dialoqued with a police officer, paramedic, occupational therapist and speech pathologist, and paraplegic patients,



tried various movements without using our legs and core, and gained insights into different health care related careers. Further through SHSM, I earned certifications in First Aid & CPR, Infection Control, and WHMIS. The total cost to me for all my SHSM certifications and field trips was \$0.00, but the value extracted has been considerable.

I personally know that deciding on a future career can seem daunting, but by electing to take Co-op and participating in SHSM, I have been successfully guided towards a career choice that works well for me. I now know I want to be an X-Ray technician!
