

## YRDSB Student Trustees: Student Voice Matters!

Smart, thoughtful, caring leadership: these characteristics shone through the screen when PEAC had an opportunity to chat virtually with two of YRDSB's Student Trustees recently. Holly Schlamb, Indigenous Student Trustee and Prisha Bhavsar, Student Trustee, are high school students who represent their classmates' voices to the York Region District School Board (YRDSB) on topics that include mental health, equity and inclusivity, education, environment/sustainability, funding, technology and many more. The YRDSB has 3 student trustees. We had the pleasure of speaking with two of them for this article.

# Meet Holly Schlamb: Indigenous Student Trustee

Holly Schlamb is a Grade 12 Métis student at Richmond Hill High School and is a active member of the YRDSB's Indigenous Student Council. Holly enjoyed participating in the events developed by the Indigenous Student Council to engage the student population in learning and connecting. Her road to Indigenous Student Trustee leadership was inspired by her predecessors in the role and the impact they have had at the YRDSB level. It's her goal to similarly inspire future Indigenous students in this role.



During her term as Indigenous Trustee, Holly will focus on improving the process of "self-identifying" for Indigenous students. By working with the YRDSB to simplify the current process, she hopes she can clarify the confusing and complex path and help the YRDSB to meet the needs of its Indigenous youth. Holly is also planning events to bring together students and Knowledge Keepers from the regions' Indigenous peoples to share and expand on traditional teachings. Promoting Indigenous student voice is another priority for Holly. She will work with Prisha to gather and promote student opinion with the YRDSB's decision makers.

For Holly, "the best part of being a student trustee has been meeting people and getting to experience opportunities that we otherwise wouldn't get to experience." Holly is also an active leader in her local school community. She is involved in the Gender and Sexuality Alliance and the Equity and Inclusivity Committee at Richmond Hill High. She also acts as an advisor for indigenous events in her school community.

## Meet Prisha Bhavsar: Student Trustee

Prisha Bhavsar is passionate about elevating student voice. A grade 11 student at Stouffville District Secondary School, Prisha started her road to Student Trustee via "Future Majority," a nonpartisan, non profit organization for young people that makes politics more accessible (futuremajority.ca). Involvement with her school's Student Council and York Region's President's Council allowed her to connect with likeminded students and to act as a bridge between the YRDSB and its student population. Now, as Student Trustee, she is a leader who represents her peers as a powerful influence within the YRDSB.



Prisha's plans for her term as Student Trustee start with gathering feedback using a student survey to understand the top areas of concern. One of her priorities will be developing Board programs to help facilitate mental health related to exam stress. Prisha feels "this is understandable. Some of the students have never taken an exam before, or they're in grade 12 and it has been years since they've taken one, so there is a lot of stress around what to expect." She will also work on developing transparent communication with students using multiple social media platforms including Instagram, Twitter and YouTube.

Prisha has found that the best part about her role as Student Trustee is connecting with students and her ability to influence what is happening at the board level. She has seen firsthand how many ways students can become involved to positively impact the YRDSB's direction and policy development. She encourages students to get involved within their schools by participating in Student Council and in York Region's President's Council. Both provide opportunities to participate in student lead initiatives and "to meet and work with really cool people."

Prisha acts locally in her role as Co-Chair in her school's "Empower Student Partnership." The group partners with community organizations to support student wellness and develop events such as visits with therapy dogs to promote mental health. STEM Club and Student Council round out her high school experience.

What is a Student Trustee's role?

Student trustees work at three different levels:

#### At the YRDSB board level

.Attending board meetings and advisory committees representing student voice and input



Collecting and representing the opinions of students across the board.

### At provincial level through the Ontario Student's Trustees Association

Representing YRDSB, they share initiatives and best practices and develop a student platform to provide recommendations to the Ministry of Education.
